

# **FINAL REPORT**

## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Pope Francis has officially proclaimed September 1<sup>st</sup> to October 4<sup>th</sup> the Season of Creation for the Catholic Church. The Creation Care Commission (CCC) of the Archdiocese of Indianapolis, with support from Mundell & Associates, spearheaded an effort to spread the message of prayer and action to protect creation. Education and action programs including advocacy activities were undertaken at the archdiocesan level as well as supporting individuals and parishes in their prayer services, school climate strikes, and tree plantings.

The CCC recommends continuing the program next year, with special focus on obtaining funding for tree planting and working further in advance with parishes to hold prayer services during the Season of Creation and/or hold a "Green Mass" for all those who support and work in the field of the environment.

# **Highlights**

Over the course of the 5 weeks, these were our highlights:

- Planting more than 200 trees in the archdiocese, with St. Gabriel making a small effort that turned into a big impact
- Involvement and excitement of students and faculty from St. Thomas Aquinas School for their Climate Strike
- Connecting with new parishes and individuals; continued participation of some of the Living Laudato Si' pilot program participants
- People from outside the Archdiocese also participated and used resources for tree plantings and education.





## 2019 PROGRAM COMPONENTS

Efforts were made at both the archdiocesan level and by individual parishes. Although the Creation Care Commission did not plan individual parish events, they are worth noting as part of the Season of Creation programming.

# At the Archdiocesan Level (and beyond!)

### Education

One of the major focuses of the CCC for this year's Season of Creation was to educate parishes and individuals about what the Season of Creation is and how to live it.

### Activities included:

- Speaking at the Priest's Deanery meeting
- Drafting a column in the archdiocesan newspaper The Criterion at the start of the Season of Creation for Archbishop Thompson
- Placing an ad in The Criterion to encourage people to join in the prayer, action and tree
  planting; we also created a Spanish version of this flier for a Teens4Unity group in the El
  Paso diocese.

- Developing a 5-week, week-by-week guide with daily actions, reflection, and background science information on high impact areas (energy, water, transportation, recycling); downloaded 58 times
- Promoting themed weekdays (*e.g.*, Meatless Mondays Laudato Si' Sundays) with actionable items, background information, and further reading; downloaded 50 times
- Providing weekly bulletin paragraph inserts that went out to parishes
- Screening of the film "Bag It" at Our Lady of Lourdes (organized by the Eastside Creation Care Network)

# **Tree Planting**

A second big focus of the CCC efforts was inviting parishes to participate in an archdiocesanwide tree planting on October 4<sup>th</sup>, the Feast of St. Francis and last day of the Season of Creation. Research was done to find qualified tree purchase locations for each county in the archdiocese to enable the purchase of trees at affordable costs.

More interest in the idea of planting trees was generated after an effort was made to centralize the purchase of trees from Woody Warehouse and offer 5 free trees to a set number of parishes. A total of 200 trees (Red Maple, Sycamore, and Tulip Poplar) were purchased ranging from \$10.50 - \$14 per tree (including delivery to 2 Indianapolis parish locations).

# **Advocacy**

The CCC participated in the September 20 Global Climate Strike in solidarity with young people all over the world. A prayer service was held at St. John the Evangelist in Indianapolis before heading to strike with other groups from around the city at the Indiana Statehouse. A small group attended the prayer service, with 3 generations represented. Members of the commission engaged in discussions with bystanders at the event who were interested in the signs we held.



### **Social Media and Website**

Much of the work to spread the word about the Season of Creation was done through the CCC Facebook group and Flocknote email subscribers who signed up on OurCommonHome.org website. Highlights included:

- The Facebook group more than doubled (from 19 to 43 people)
- 35 people (including people from around the archdiocese, the United States, and one participant from Argentina) put their points on the map at the OurCommonHome.org website.
- 35 people (same as above) received a weekly email in Flocknote with action items, background information, and inspirational links about areas of high impact.
- In response to increased activity on social media, the CCC created a Twitter account and new Facebook page at the handle @CommonHomeIndy. The current Facebook group will remain to allow group discussions of best practices.

# At the Parish Level

## **Connecting with Parishes**

In response to the educational and social media outreach efforts, many new connections were made with parishes during the Season of Creation. These include:

- Sacred Heart (members of the CCC spoke during three of their Masses and gave away 5 trees)
- St. Thomas the Apostle (interest in starting Creation Care Team)
- St. Mary of the Knobs (interest in starting creation care initiatives)
- Christ the King (interest in starting Creation Care Team)
- Bishop Chatard High School (reached out to make the faculty advisor aware of the tree planting event and CCC, she was happy to connect)

The CCC is discussing how best to follow up with these parishes.

# **Prayer Services**

Various prayer services took place across the archdiocese at the beginning of the Season of Creation and on October 4. These were planned by the parishes/schools, although members of the CCC attended some and assisted St. Gabriel in finding a prayer service in both English and Spanish.

- St. Thomas Aquinas (beginning)
- Holy Spirit Indianapolis (beginning)
- St. Gabriel (Oct 4)
- Christ the King (Oct 4)
- Sisters of St. Benedict (Oct 4)

### **School Climate Strike**

St. Thomas Aquinas School undertook a significant effort to hold a school-wide climate strike on September 27. The activities were organized within a week of one teacher being inspired with a nudge from parishioner and CCC member Sharon Horvath. Highlights of the day included a prayer service, a presentation by Earth Charter Indiana, door decorating, and students taking to the street with their banners made in Art and Science class. ## **EVALUATION**

Being the first year of organizing activities for the Season of Creation, the CCC was overall pleased with the response and actions taken by individuals and parishes. There are several clear areas of improvement.

# **Improvements for Next Year**

**Reaching out to individual parishes/schools:** Time was spent this year creating and researching the education resources, emails, and tree purchasing information at the beginning and middle of the Season of Creation. Some activities were finalized within a week and did not have much time to be distributed. It is suggested to:

- Have all programs and tree planting information in place at least a month before the Season of Creation begins
- Reach out to participants in this year's programs a month in advance to encourage them
  to hold prayer services for the beginning of the Season of Creation and coordinate
  efforts to involve parishioners in tree plantings;
- Reach out to new parishes / schools at the beginning of the Season of Creation to encourage planting trees on the parish property. Start with parishes we know have Creation Care Teams or clubs.
- Create a School Climate Strike plan to distribute to schools based on the activities of St. Thomas Aquinas.

**Coordination of Tree Plantings:** At the beginning of the Season of Creation there was some back and forth about trees being free or groups having to purchase them on their own. 70% of the cost of the trees (about \$2,000 total) was sponsored by Mundell & Associates, with most groups signing on after free trees were offered. The distribution of the trees was not much of an issue this year; however, it could be improved on. Suggestions for next year include:

- Obtain sponsorship of \$2000 \$5,000 to purchase trees from Woody Warehouse to give away to parishes
- Coordinating tree delivery to 2 far south locations (Woody Warehouse only delivers within 60 mile radius of Lizton, Indiana)
- Working further in advance with the parishes to hold a prayer service associated with the tree planting or make that a 'requirement' for receiving the free trees
- Encourage parishes who planted trees this year to reach out to at least one other parish and encourage them plant some trees
- Create a guide of how to engage parishioners based on the success of St. Gabriel

Alternatively, we could coordinate tree plantings in the spring, by ordering from the Vallonia State Nursery. These small seedlings are less than 50 cents each and are shipped at the beginning of March; however there is no guaranteed ship date which could create planning problems.

## **New Initiatives**

In addition to improvements mentioned, the following are additional programs that could be added:

**Hosting an archdiocesan-wide Green Mass and event:** Several parishes across the country host "Green Masses" on October 4<sup>th</sup> (the Feast Day of St. Francis) for all those interested in the care of creation, as well as those working in the environmental field. The CCC recommends:

- Holding a Green Mass on October 4<sup>th</sup>
- Including a tree planting by the Archbishop following the Mass

**Tapping into interactive eco-challenge programs:** Create parish level challenges that are spread and coordinated via social media. ## CONCLUSIONS

The CCC was encouraged by the different activities and new contacts made during the first efforts to highlight the Season of Creation. With permanent placement in both the school and church calendar years, the Season of Creation has an opportunity to develop into a far reaching and key program of the CCC, and may act as a springboard for increased environmental awareness and engagement at the local parish level.

We hope to expand funding and coordination for next year's activities starting in early 2020.


